New PACA report reveals extent of over-exclusion of special needs pupils across Milton Keynes Secondary Schools

Schools' attitudes to exclusion have been revealed in a new report from PACA. The extent of overexclusion of children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) has been documented in new school league tables based on data obtained in a Freedom of Information request. The report also draws on our database of case studies from families in Milton Keynes.

The report looks at the experience of 3 groups over a 5-year period: those without any SEND, those on "SEN Support" and those with an EHCP* (for whom schools receive extra financial support from the council). We looked at the rates of Fixed Term Exclusions (FTE), the length of FTE and the number of permanent exclusions. Pupils with SEND are vulnerable to being removed from familiar routines and settings, especially those with an EHCP. Schools are supposed to take this into account when deciding the length of exclusion. We also looked at exclusions of over 5 days, for which schools have to arrange education at another site, which is particularly difficult to cope with for pupils with SEND and especially so for those with an EHCP.

Findings

Pupils with no SEND

• 100-fold difference in Fixed Term Exclusion (FTE) rates between the highest-excluding school (Herbert Leon) and the lowest-excluding school.

Pupils on SEN Support

- School positions in the league tables were similar to their positions for pupils with no SEND.
- 5 times more likely to be excluded than those with no SEND (FTE and permanent exclusions).
- On average excluded for 5 times more days in total than children with no SEND.

Pupils with an EHCP

- Over-excluded by some schools. Top of the league table was Ousedale: EHCP children were 10 time more likely to be excluded than those with no SEND.
- Excluded for longer by some schools. Top of the league table was Ousedale: EHCP children were excluded for 13 times more days in total.
- At Ousedale (top of the table again), EHCP children were 20x more likely to be given an FTE of over 5 days.

Comment

Children with SEND are well-known to be disproportionately excluded from school. While schools are allowed to exclude pupils with special needs, the Equality Act effectively requires them to show that they have met the child's needs in an anticipatory manner. Otherwise, to punish a child and withdraw their education, for reasons that flow from their SEND and without having met their needs (in a way that could have prevented the exclusion), would be to discriminate against them.

The question is, if schools are providing adequate support, why are rates of exclusion so disproportionately high for pupils with SEND? And why are some schools excluding those vulnerable children for so much longer than other pupils?



Susan Akhtar, Chair of PACA MK, said, "Parents tell us they understand that ensuring safety in schools is paramount, but that meetings pupils' needs would be more effective than punishing them. Our report shows that schools in MK take very different approaches to tackling this problem".
